## Synthesis and Photocatalytic Property of Zinc oxide Nanoparticles from Cymbopogon citratus

## Abstract

ZnO nanoparticles were synthesized from the aqueous extract of Cymbopogon citratus using zinc sulphate heptahydrate as the metal precursor. The obtained particles were characterized by Fourier transform infrared spectroscopy, X-ray powder diffraction, and scanning electron microscopy. The photocatalytic activity of ZnO NP's on the degradation of organic dye methyl orange was studied. The study was carried out under solar radiation and the results prove the ZnO NP's is a significant photocatalyst.

## Biochemical Effect of Heavy Metals on Salvinia Molesta

#### Abstract

Phytoremediation is the natural ability of certain plants to bioaccumulate, degrade or render harmLess contaminants in soil, water and air. Hydrophytes due to their large amount of existence in the ecosystem and its uses as an indicator for the removal of heavy metals from the industrial effluents are of current interest. The effluents coming out from industries had high concentration of chromium, lead, copper and cadmium. One month laboratory experiments have been conducted to mark the percentage removal of different heavy metals at different concentrations and the effect of heavy metals on nitrate reductase activity, total chlorophyll and protein contents of the plant. Approximately 93% of total heavy metals present in the medium were accumulated by Salvinia molesta at lower concentration used in the experiment. At higher concentrations heavy metal induced-toxicity appears resulting in the reduced activities of nitrate reductase, total chlorophyll and protein contents of the plant. The results recommended the use of Salvinia molesta to ameliorate the waste water contaminated with heavy metals.

Physical spaces. Mind spaces. Thoughts and abstracted repetition of physical spaces. Cartography helps analyse the travel between these 'spaces', helps us assess a situation and mark escape routes from disaster scenarios or Totalitarian cities.

This paper will examine the cartographies drawn by the experiences of workers in a city under control. It will explore the spatial relationship from the sewers of Prague to the cellars in order to understand the people who inhabit these cellars while they work.

Work which "in the conditions prevailing here, it is rare for someone to be doing what he was trained to do, or what he is suited for"-Klima.

This paper will examine these concerns through a study of Bohumil Hrabal's *Too Loud a Solitude* and Ivan Klima 's My Golden Trades. The workers in both the books practice trades in a city (Prague) which are determined by a system and not the individual. The politics of the system and the mapping of a city affect the individual worker. Both writers explore life in Prague under the Communist Regime before the Velvet Revolution. Ironically while these individual workers perform their bound duties, their experiences shape their minds and thoughts much against the intention of the Regime.

A series of blue collar jobs examined by Klima and Hrabal in their stories, tell us how new maps are created with these new experiences. As the Czech proverb goes – for him with nine trades the tenth is poverty. So how does the world of books impact a worker who destroys them for a profession? How does the path of a courier boy mark the experiences of an outcast writer? This paper hopes to examine cartographies of these workers in Prague – the city under control and see how the maps cease to be just physical lines but become more experiential cartographies of a Totalitarian existence.

## The Dalit: Historical and Literary Imaginings

## **Abstract**

In 2018, the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting issued an advisory, urging the use of the constitutionally validated term 'Scheduled Caste' in public discourse, as against the perceived derogatory reference 'dalit'. Scholars, intellectuals, activists immediately responded, invoking the cultural and political legacy of the term, which has come to be associated with Ambedkarite thought and struggle. Under the Poona Pact of 1932, the word 'dalit' came to represent a caste/community/ collective, historically oppressed by the 'upper'/privileged castes. The Pact announced the right and need of the dalit to reservation of electoral seats. While the official term 'Scheduled Caste' indicated the legality of a distributive category, Ambedkar emphasized on the word 'dalit' to historicise the struggle and identity of a people, otherwise unrepresented by mainstream narratives. In its moment of christening, the word 'dalit' wrestled for dignity and humaneness, against the paternalising 'harijan'. It also tried to redress and subvert the limitations of 'jhoothan' (waste) or 'achyut' (untouchable). In the 1970s, the Dalit Panther Movement reclaimed the word with new political and cultural charge. The dalit in Panther discourse was the post-Independence child of equality, raising questions about India's 'tryst with destiny'. The paper takes a retrospective look at the emergence of the epistemological category 'dalit' from its long, submerged history of 'untouchability'. The 'story' of the dalit thus subsumes within it several strands of histories from below. At a time, when the nation is grappling with multiple chronicles of resistance, to be a dalit might have resonance, at various levels, with the existential reality of being 'crushed', 'oppressed' or 'grounded'.
